Ysgol Carrog is currently in Category 4 where learners are taught mainly through the medium of English with Welsh taught as a second language. We will be moving to T2 as we move forward with learners being taught using and English equally—50% of the curriculum in English and 50% in Welsh.

Within a caring and disciplined framework, the school endeavors to provide a balanced education in the fullest sense and to encourage pupils to develop their individual personalities, interests and potential to the full.

We aim:



SCHOOL SITE

The school was opened in 1909 and an extension added in 1998. The classrooms are attractively laid out and the school's facilities include:

- Well stocked school libraries
- Attractive school grounds which include two playgrounds, outdoor teaching areas, a forest school area and a fun trail
- IT devices which include class i-pads and Chromebooks
- Well resourced classrooms—all with interactive clevertouch screens.



ORGANISATION

At present Ysgol Carrog accommodates 23 full time children of infant/junior age, along with 4 part-time nursery pupils. There is 1 intake of children at the beginning of the school year in September along with 2 in-

takes of Rising 3 pupils at the beginning of the Spring and Summer term. Pupils are admitted to the Nursery in the September following their 3rd birthday. They are offered Nursery Education for 5 mornings per week. Children are admitted into the Reception Infants Class for full time education in the September following their 4th birthday. Within the school there is 1 Infants class and 1 Junior class. Teaching Hours: Infants 22 hours, Juniors 23.5 hours.



A member of Staff will be at the gate to welcome the children at 8.55am It is important that your child arrives punctually at the start of every school session and is collected at 3.15pm



TRAVELLING TO SCHOOL

The school encourages parents to walk; cycle or share lifts when bringing their children to school. We ask for everyone's cooperation in ensuring the children's safety. The school's Eco Committee stress the need for parents to think of the environment when considering ways of travelling to school.

Pupils access the school through the pedestrian gates only. We regularly hold cycle proficiency training for children in Years 5 & 6 as well as Kerbcraft training for children in Years 1 & 2. Cycle storage racks are available for pupils to use.

LEAVING THE SCHOOL

No child will be allowed out of school during school hours without a written request addressed to the Head teacher and signed by the parent. Infant pupils will not be allowed to leave the school premises, under any circumstances, unless a parent or other responsible person, known to be acting on behalf of the parent collects them. Open sessions are held in November and January for prospective parents to view the school.

ADMISSION

The entry of children into schools is controlled and administered by Denbighshire County Council. Their policy can be found on their website www.denbighshire.gov.uk. Denbighshire offers a single entry in September each year. Ysgol Carrog has an overall pupil capacity of 60 and the admission number for nursery place is 9. A school booklet containing details of nursery education is sent to parents of prospective nursery pupils. Parents are also invited to visit the school during the term before the child is admitted in order to discuss school procedures with members of staff.

SCHOOL UNIFORM

White or red polo shirt with or without logo

Red sweatshirt or cardigan with the school logo

Grey, charcoal, or black school trousers (school shorts in the summer term)

Grey, navy or black skirt (length - no shorter than the knee)

Red checked dress (Summer term)

White, grey, black or red socks/tights

Flat black shoes/trainers (flat sandals with a strap can be worn in the summer term) If wellington boots are worn to school a change of footwear must also be provided.


Hair – neat and tidy, no extremes of style or colour (To be tied back for PE and swimming lessons)

No make-up or nail varnish to be worn

No tattoos to be worn

Jewellery – only watches and stud earrings to be worn.

The school uniform can be ordered from sales@workplace-worksafe.co.uk in Ruthin. Second hand uniform is also available free of charge from school.



SCHOOL DINNERS

School meals are cooked on the premises. All school meals are nutritionally balanced in line with Welsh Government recommendations (known as Appetite for Life). Copies of the school menu will be sent home regularly across the year and the weekly menu features in our newsletters. All pupils receive Universal Free school meals this scheme is different to the Benefit Free School meal scheme. Children are also allowed to bring a healthy packed lunch. We have leaflets available which provide information about balanced packed lunches. Children should NOT bring glass containers or sweets to school. All pupils now receive free universal free school meals.

If you think your child is entitled to a free school meal, please contact either the school secretary or the Benefits office on 01824 706316 or 706312 or 706302.

WATER

We actively encourage pupils to drink water throughout the school day as it helps boost concentration and promotes good health. Children are given water bottles at the start of nursery. Children have access to water coolers throughout the day to fill their bottles. Bottles can be purchased from the school office for £1.50. Water bottles are sent home each day for cleaning. Please do not send juice or flavoured water in their bottles.

BREAKFAST CLUB

We have a breakfast club at the school. The club starts at 8:15am and breakfast is served until 8:30 am. The club runs until 8:55am 5 mornings a week. The food provided is in line with Welsh Government recommendations and includes non sugar coated and non chocolate coated cereals, toast, fruit juice and fruit. On occasions we provide healthy variations in the food provided. The cost for Breakfast Club is £1 per day per child and should be paid through Parentpay. (The cost for FSM pupils is £1 per week per child). Parents wishing to book their child into Breakfast Club should do so by completing the booking form on the schools Facebook page by Friday 12noon for the previous week.


BREAKTIME FOOD

All infant pupils are entitled to free school milk which they receive at morning break. Ysgol Carrog is part of Denbighshire's Healthy School initiative, pupils are allowed to bring their own fruit or vegetables from home as a mid morning snack which is to be cut up to minimise the risk of choking. We do not allow crisps, sweets or chocolate or sandwiches.

PACKED LUNCHES

In the warmer months if pupils bring their own packed lunches, we suggest that they are kept cool (especially if they contain cooled meats or dairy products). We do not have a fridge to store packed lunches in school so we suggest you place ice packs or a frozen carton of juice in the packed lunch box to keep the contents cool.

If packed lunches are prepared the night before, always store them in a fridge overnight.




ABSENCE

Regular attendance is most important. If your child is absent, please let us know the reason as soon as possible by a written letter, telephone call or a personal visit. If possible, please let us know beforehand of appointments at the hospital, dentist, and doctor etc., your child can then be given his/her registration mark.

If an appointment involves your child leaving school during the day, please arrange to meet him/her from school, as we discourage children going home on their own during the day for reasons of personal safety. Please request a medical card from the school secretary which require a stamp/signature from the appointment.

If it is necessary to take the family on holiday during the term time, please ask for a leave of absence form from the school. Denbighshire's policy is not to authorise any leave of absence but the Governors have agreed for the Headteacher to authorise an absence if the child's attendance is above 95% which is our attendance target.





MEDICAL

Please let us know of any helpful medical information about your child e.g. disabilities, allergies and the need for medication at school. You will be asked to fill in a medication form. Please also inform us of any change of address or telephone number.

If both parents are working during the day, it is useful for us to have a telephone number of a relative, friend, neighbour, etc., whom we can contact if your child is taken ill during the day.

During your child's Reception year you will be sent a health questionnaire by the School Health service. Medicals will be arranged for your child if necessary—that is, if there is any health issues which could affect your child's education. Hearing, Vision, Height and Weight monitoring will be carried out with your consent by the Health Care Assistants, under the school nurses supervision. The School Health Service will be available to your child throughout their stay at school.

ILLNESS

Should your child suffer with an illness or condition for example Chicken pox, Impetigo, Mumps etc., we have an up to date list from Conwy and Denbighshire NHS Trust regarding recommended exclusion periods from school. We promote good hand hygiene and the importance of using tissues when they have a cold.

SCHOOL SAFETY


The safety of our pupils is of paramount importance to the Governors who continue to monitor all aspects of Health and Safety at Ysgol Carrog. If it is necessary for you to pick up your child during school hours, please use the main entrance/office. All the school gates are closed, and we ask for them to be kept closed during the school day to maintain the children's safety. No child is permitted to open any external doors to visitors.

SUN SAFETY

During the sunnier weather we encourage children to bring in water bottles, sun screen and hats. The children will receive a sun safety lesson and you will be asked to sign a sun safety consent letter. Pupils are not allowed to share sun tan lotion.

ACCIDENTS/EMERGENCIES

Despite our utmost care, accidents do sometimes occur. Several members of staff have had First Aid Training and there are adequate First Aid facilities at school. The majority of accidents are minor ones and are dealt with there and then on the spot. A note is sent home if any basic First Aid is administered—eg plaster applied. In the event of a serious accident, an attempt will be made to contact you. If you cannot be contacted, the Head teacher, Assistant Head teacher or Teacher in Charge reserve the right to act on medical advice and take whatever action is necessary. You will be asked to complete a form giving the name of your Doctor, and telephone numbers and addresses where you may be contacted in an emergency.



THE CURRICULUM

Our curriculum encompasses the developmental needs of children. At the centre of the statutory curriculum framework lie the holistic development of children and their skills across the curriculum, building on their previous learning experiences, knowledge and skills.

Children learn through first-hand experimental activities with the serious business of 'play' providing the vehicle in their formative years. Through their play, children practise and consolidate their learning, play with ideas, experiment, take risks, solve problems, and make decisions individually, in small and in large groups. First-hand experiences allow children to develop an understanding of themselves and the world in which they live. The development of children's self-image and feelings of self-worth and self-esteem are at the core of this phase.

The curriculum aims to be up-to-date and motivating for all learners. Subject and skills framework content has been revised to produce an enriched curriculum that will motivate and meet the needs of individual learners The statutory Areas of Learning are:

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

ICT VISION

Information Technology and Communication is an integral part of modern life today. Our aim therefore is to develop every child's confidence in ICT to prepare them for the changing technological world ahead of them. By accessing the various and latest technological resources, the pupils ICT skills will be extended through exciting and interesting methods. We ensure that all staff and pupils at Ysgol Carrog have a positive attitude towards ICT and will develop the necessary skills in the subject to aid cross curricular teaching and learning.

PLANNING FOR ICT

As a school we embody ICT skills within learning experiences across the curriculum so that we ensure a continuation of skills throughout the school.

RESOURCES

The school is fully networked so ICT can be accessed by all throughout the school. There are computers, laptops, Chromebooks and i-pads along with interactive teaching resources. These learning resources are all used by students as study aids. We pride ourselves in being innovative in the use of new technologies whilst using the best of traditional methods of teaching. The school use ICT as a tool for homework, with home access for pupils on specialist software.

INTERNET SAFETY RULES

- All pupils have access to PC'S and Chrome books and the school will set rules for you to use them.
- You will only be able to use the PC's/Chrome books or the Internet when a teacher or other member of staff is present.
- You will be able to use the internet, but only sites chosen by the School.
- You will only be allowed to play games chosen by the School.
- You will only be able to use safe search engines.
- The PC/Chrome books and Internet use may be monitored by the School and your parents or carers told if you are not using them safely.
- If you see any pictures or file while using the school PC's/Chrome books that make you feel uncomfortable report it to a teacher or member of school staff.
- Do not give anybody your name, address or name of your school to anybody you speak to on the Internet.
- Do not arrange to meet someone you meet on the Internet.
- Do not send messages that you know will upset someone.



RELIGION, VALUES & ETHICS (RVE)

Religion, Values and Ethics replaces 'Religious Education' under the New Curriculum for Wales (CFW). It is taught within the Humanities Area of Learning. It also reflects the Four Purposes of the Curriculum. Through the teaching of RVE will learn that religious traditions in Wales are in the main Christian. Pupils will also learn about the teaching and practices of other Religions represented in Wales. RVE is taught in an objective and impartial way that does not encourage pupils to be religious or non-religious. Parents and carers cannot withdraw their child(ren)

The assemblies will have a different focus. These include stories from the Bible, moral stories, SEAL (Social & Emotional Aspects of Learning) stories as well as stories based around national events and school values.

We also have a thought of the week which we reflect on during the week, as well as our core school values.

Occasionally, our local Vicar, Rev. Phil Carey will pay us a visit and take a whole school

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Physical Education is a very important part of the National Curriculum. We believe in educating children about healthy lifestyles. As we do not have our own school hall we use the village hall which is opposite the school. The hall is suitable for gymnastics and dance activities, and we have access to village field for rounders and athletics and team games The children in years 3-6 are transported to Corwen swimming pool where they follow an ASA swimming programme.

When the pupils have PE or swimming lessons they may come to school wearing tracksuit bottoms and trainers.





PUPIL VOICE

SCHOOL COUNCIL

We have an active school council made up of representatives from all year groups. The children are elected every year by their peers and meet regularly, with the support of Mrs Mollison-White to discuss school issues including promoting UNICEF children's rights within the school and complete the Child Commissioners for Wales special missions every term in the school.

ECO-COMMITTEE

We have an active Eco committee made up of representatives from all year groups. The children are elected every year by their peers and regularly meet with Aunty Nicola to discuss 'green' issues and to discuss ideas regarding school meals, working with our cook Aunty Catrin.

JUNIOR ROAD SAFETY OFFICERS/SUN SAFETY OFFICERS

Older Junior pupils are selected to be our road safety officers. They run competitions throughout the year to highlight the importance of safety to all pupils. Kerbcraft lessons are also run with the infant pupils.

PLAYGROUND BUDDIES


It is our playground buddies job to ensure everyone is happy and healthy at play and lunch times and help people if they can.

Sports are chosen to promote sport and healthy choices within the school.

CRIW CYMRAEG

These pupils work with Mrs Rees and promote the Welsh language and ethos in the school. This is part of the Welsh government "Siarter Iaith Gymraeg" / Cymraeg Campus initiative.



RELATIONSHIPS & SEXUALITY EDUCATION (RSE)

EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES


The school has a strategic equality plan that ensures equality of education and opportunity for all pupils, staff, parents and carers receiving services from the school, irrespective of disability, race, gender, age, sexual orientation religion or belief, gender reassignment, pregnancy and maternity, marriage and civil Partnership. We aim to develop a culture of inclusion and diversity in which all those connected to the school feel proud of their identity and area able to participate fully in school life. We will tackle discrimination by the positive promotion of equality, challenging bullying and stereotypes and creating an environment which champions respect to all.

DATA PROTECTION

The school collects information about pupils and their parents at admission to school and for specific purposes during the school year. Every effort is made to ensure the accuracy and security of the data collected which is generally stored on the school's computerised management information system. Individuals have certain rights of access to personal information that local authorities and the Welsh Government hold about them.

EDUCATIONAL VISITS

All pupils are given an opportunity to take part in an educational trip or visit occasionally. You will be informed well in advance of any educational visits. Children are expected to wear school uniform on any day outings unless directed otherwise. Children in the upper Juniors are given the opportunity of attending a residential centre, usually for 1 or 2 nights either at Glanllyn or the Urdd Centre in Cardiff.



TRANSFER TO SECONDARY SCHOOL

In order to ensure continuity in bilingual education our pupils are transferred to Ysgol Dinas Bran Llangollen or Ysgol Brynhyfryd Ruthin. A close relationship has been established and there exists constant cooperation between the schools.

There is a transition plan in place between the secondary school and our cluster of schools which includes how continuity of learning will be achieved through curriculum design, how individual pupil's progression will be supported as they transition and how learning needs and well-being will be supported

GOVERNING DOCUMENTS

Documents produced 'by' and 'for' the governing body are available for viewing at the school provided that the Head teacher or Chair of the Governor's receiving notification of such request.

ASSESSMENT AND MONITORING

In line with the curriculum for Wales, effective feedback and assessment for learning are ongoing throughout the day. A progress report is given to parents in the summer term and open evenings (3 per year) also give parents an opportunity to see and discuss their child's progress with the class teacher. Pupils from years 2-6 complete the personalised assessments in reading, numeracy procedural and reasoning. Termly Assessments weeks are carried out by class teachers to monitor progress and set next steps, this information is then included in our pupil

COMPLAINTS PROCEDURE

If you are unhappy about any aspect of your child's education, curricular or pastoral care please speak to the class teacher or contact the Headteacher. Most problems can be dealt with in school. If you are still unhappy with the way the complaint is dealt with, please contact the Chair of Governors. If parents feel unsatisfied with the way a complaint is handled, then the Local Authority can be contacted. Formal complaints policy and procedures is available form the school office.

PERIPATETIC MUSIC LESSONS

Pupils can receive peripatetic music lessons from vocal, harp, guitar, piano and drums during the school year. The lessons are provided by Denbighshire Music Cooperative. Instruments are supplied on loan. The cost is £90 per term / £270 per year (£45 per term / £135 per year for those receiving Free School Meals) for 30 lessons. The cost of lessons are currently subsidised by the governing body for those receiving Free School Meals.



PARENT PARTICIPATION

Parents are warmly invited to become involved in the life of the school. We encourage parents to become involved during the school day, assisting with various activities. If you feel that you could offer some assistance, please contact the Head teacher. We have an active Parent Teachers' Friends Association (PTFA). This association exists to assist the school in any possible way, through social and community activities to raise funds for the provision of equipment, which would not normally be provided by the Education Authority. All parents are welcome to become involved and if interested or require more information please contact the Headteacher or Assistant head. We hold parent engagement activities every term within every class where we invite family members in to work with children and staff on projects, lessons or trips.

COMMUNICATION BETWEEN HOME AND SCHOOL

During the course of the year, there are scheduled occasions when parents are invited to school for a discussion with their child's class teacher. It is also important to note that parents are welcome to visit the school at any time to discuss their children's education and welfare, or any problems they may have. Please acknowledge teachers inability to leave their class during lesson time. If you would like to talk to us, kindly make arrangements beforehand. A weekly newsletter is provided to keep parents up to date with events at the school. We also have a facebook page, a twitter account, text messages as well as a website which are invaluable ways of communicating between home and school.

SEESAW


Every pupil has their own individual Seesaw account and log in details for this are sent home at the beginning of the school year. Once you are logged in those log in details will remain the same throughout their time at Ysgol Carrog. Seesaw gives staff the opportunity to share some of the pupils' work, the experiences they are having and messages with home. The children use seesaw to share work, missions, tasks completed with school staff and parents. On occasions homework tasks made be set using seesaw. You are able to "like and comment" on the work the children share with you.

HOMEWORK

There is no official homework set for the pupils. All pupils have access to online learning resources that can be used to enhance learning at home through language, maths and digital activities, log in details are sent home at the beginning of the year. A firm commitment to reading is expected throughout the school. Pupils in Dosbarth Berwyn are sent home with a book and depending on fluency, Dosbarth Dyfrdwy will send as needed otherwise the pupils can access books from our library should they require to do so. Word lists are put onto Seesaw and can be practised at home.

PASTORAL CARE

Care of the children is the responsibility of all the staff but each child is placed in the specific care of a class teacher. By encouraging self-discipline and self-esteem we hope that each child will become a worthy member of the community and we look for parental support in this matter.



ADDITIONAL LEARNING NEEDS

Pupils with Additional Learning Needs (ALN) are supported through an Individual Development Plan (IDP). In this plan all of their Additional Learning Provision (ALP) will be recorded and monitored. The processes and expectations of how this is managed are outlined in the 'Additional learning Needs code for Wales'

Pupils without an ALN but who require a boost or some extra support may benefit from accessing programmes and interventions from our universal offer of provision – this is how, as a school, we cater for the differentiated needs of a co-hort of pupils. At times children may require some additional targeted support and may be offered further extra programmes and support. Further details of this can be found in our school's 'Inclusion Protocol' document.

All pupils have individual targets which are monitored termly.

Parents are welcome to discuss the 'Additional learning Needs code for Wales' and the 'Inclusion Protocol' with the Head teacher and members of staff.

The decision to admit children with disabilities is made in consultation with the Head teacher, Governors, parents and Local Education Authority The final decision would depend upon a number of factors including the level of support that can be offered to the child in order for him or her to access the curriculum and the accessibility to the child of the building and other facilities.


A child with disabilities would have their Additional Learning Provision requirements set out within their IDP, this would specify the nature of the support needed for that child to access the school and the curriculum. The Head teacher and governors would ensure that this support was provided and that any additional aids were purchased.

GROWTH MINDSET

Our wish for all pupils at Ysgol Carrog is to encourage children to become confident and resilient learners. In order to fulfil this we as a team of parents and staff need to be modelling the mindset of a learner who is not afraid to mistakes but who thrives and learns from them knowing that this is part of the learning process. The way we encourage children to learn and explore is vital to their success not only in at school but at home as well. We complete PausePoints, mindfulness activites with the children. We have sleeping lions within classrooms to aid children with their feelings.

BEHAVIOUR AND SCHOOL DISCIPLINE

The Headteacher and staff will do everything possible to create a happy school life. We expect a responsible attitude and proper, thoughtful conduct from our pupils. Pupils will be expected to show respect towards (a) school teaching and ancillary staff (b) fellow pupils, school buildings and school equipment. Guidance, rather than punishment, is the school's philosophy. If a pupil does not respond, privileges may be taken away. Serious disciplinary problems will be referred to the Head teacher and in extreme circumstances parents will be asked to visit the school for a full report. The staff uses a range of rewards to promote good behaviour throughout the school, concentrating on rewarding and praising the positives.

We work on the 3 school rules—Be ready, Be respectful, Be safe. Should these rules not be adhered to we follow the school's behaviour policy to deal with this.

USE OF REASONABLE FORCE, RESTRICTIVE PHYSICAL INTERVENTION AND 'TIME OUT'

In order to ensure the safety of all members of the school community and visitors, the school may on occasion have to resort to the use reasonable force, a restrictive physical intervention, or 'Time Out'.

Section 93 of the Education and Inspections Act 2006, replaced Section 550A of the Education Act 1966, and enables school staff to use such force as is reasonable in the circumstances to prevent a pupil from doing, or continuing to do, any of the following:


- Committing any offence (or, for a pupil under the age of criminal responsibility, what would be an offence for an older pupil)
- Causing personal injury to, or damage to the property of, any Person (including the pupil himself) or Prejudicing the maintenance of good order and discipline at the school or among any pupils receiving education at the school, whether during a teaching session or otherwise

The complete policy on the use of reasonable force and restrictive physical intervention is available on the school's web site or as a hard copy on request.

SAFEGUARDING PROCEDURES

All members of staff follow the procedures set out in the All Wales Safeguarding Procedures document, a copy of which can be obtained at the school. All staff receive bi-annual child protection training.

The named teacher for responsibility for Safeguarding and Looked After Children is Mrs. Jayne Davies; in her absence Mrs. Becky Mollison-White. If a member of staff suspects that a child has been abused or is at risk of suffering abuse the Head teacher will be immediately informed of the concern. The designated person will inform by telephone, **without delay**, the Duty Social Worker, of the Safeguarding Team and complete a referral form. Our child protection governor is Mr Jeff Eggington



WELSH

Welsh is taught at Carrog as a second language. Part of the philosophy of teaching Welsh involves learning Welsh in an incidental manner, i.e. teachers will greet children in Welsh; children may ask for things in Welsh. Most of the work entailed in learning Welsh is oral in nature although it does also involve a little written and reading work. We also celebrate and appreciate our Welsh culture. We are a predominantly English medium primary school but with significant use of Welsh (Category 4).

Pupils in the Infants experience the areas of learning in both languages but with greater emphasis on English. In the Juniors, both Welsh and English are used in teaching but there is greater emphasis on English. Welsh is used as the medium of teaching or learning for between 20% and 50% of the primary curriculum overall. The subjects of Art and PE are taught largely through the medium of Welsh. We also have a Criw Cymraeg who are working on all the Cymraeg Campus targets with Mrs Rees.



At Ysgol Carrog we want to inspire our pupils to use Welsh in all aspects of their lives. All members of the school community have a part to play including the school council, learners, parents, carers, Governors and the wider community.

Together we aim to increase the social use of Welsh in our school.

BRITISH SIGN LANGUAGE (BSL)

Our modern foreign language is BSL and is part of the LLC AOLWE and children explore and learn this language within their school experiences.

CHARGING POLICY

- Although no charge will be made for activities mainly in school time, the school will ask parents to make a voluntary contribution to meet the costs incurred by the school. It is pointed out that the school is not in a position to subsidise ANY visits and if sufficient voluntary contributions are not received then the visit will not take place.
- Charges will be made for activities, which take place mainly or wholly out of school time e.g. residential visits
- A charge for ingredients or materials for practical subjects and project assignments will be made (cash or kind) provided parents have agreed in advance that they wish to keep the finished product
- A charge will be made for the provision of music tuition
- Swimming is deemed to be part of the Curriculum of the school and there is no charge made to parents except towards the cost of transport
- Where school property is lost or damaged as a result of pupil's bad behaviour then payment from parents may be requested. Pupils who will be entitled to remission are those whose parents are in receipt of income support, job seekers allowance (income based) or child tax credit only (with an income below £13,230).



PROVISION OF TOILET FACILITIES.

There are 2 toilet blocks accessible for children. The toilets have been refurbished There is a sanitary bin in the girl's toilets. There are also staff toilets. The Caretaker/cleaner ensure the cleaning of all toilet facilities is to a high standard.


If you want to be kept informed by the school, you will be required to keep the office informed of your current contact details, including your postal and email addresses. Postal and email address details will be checked with you once a year. The school will be unable to send school reports (or any information regarding your child) unless your postal and email addresses have been confirmed by you.

HEADLICE

Head lice is a common problem that affects most people at some time or other. The aim of the policy is to reduce the problem for you as parents/carers and for us as a school. We will share information with parents/carers on a regular basis about checking for headlice and how to treat them. We ask parents/ carers to be vigilant in checking their child's hair.

If a pupil in school is suspected to have a live moving louse, their parent/carer will be informed (in confidence) so that they can check and treat the infection. If the headlice infection continues, we will send out a confidential letter to the pupils parents./carers; information may also be shared with the School Nurse so that advice and guidance can be provided. The school nurse and/or other agencies will be informed of poor hygiene including extreme or persistent cases of headlice infection. A pupil with headlice will not be excluded from school.
